Investment Perspectives

Market

The MSCI ACWI ex US Index was modestly positive, despite fears of overinvestment in AI capacity fueling continued volatility. Emerging Markets fell 3% led by South Korea (-17%) and Taiwan (-5%). These losses reflect weakness in the Information Technology (IT) sector, which fell 13% as shares of AI-related semiconductor and hardware companies declined, including ASML in the Netherlands, TSMC in Taiwan, and South Korean index heavyweights SK hynix and Samsung Electronics. In contrast, the Energy sector rose nearly 12% as the US and Iran traded attacks and the Strait of Hormuz closed again, leading to higher Brent crude prices.

Portfolio

The portfolio benefitted from its diversified positioning. Relative strength in Communication Services together with Health Care helped offset weakness in IT, where we trimmed several positions during the first half of the year following strong share price appreciation. Since peaking in mid-June, Korean memory stocks have sold off sharply as investors reassessed lofty expectations for AI-related demand and memory pricing, a decline potentially exacerbated by a surge in activity from leveraged single-stock exchange-traded products in South Korea. SK hynix (not owned), for example, reported a 557% year-over-year increase in operating profit but still fell short of consensus expectations. Semiconductor stocks such as TSMC and ASML also weakened amid AI capex concerns; reports that China has begun limited production of immersion lithography tools added to investor uncertainty. In the case of ASML, we do not believe these developments materially alter the company's long-term competitive position, as expected production volumes remain modest and execution risk remains high.

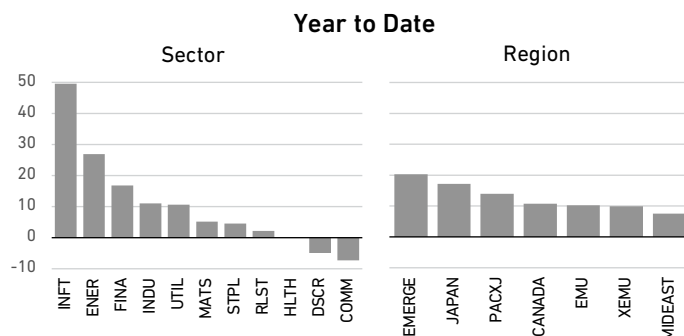
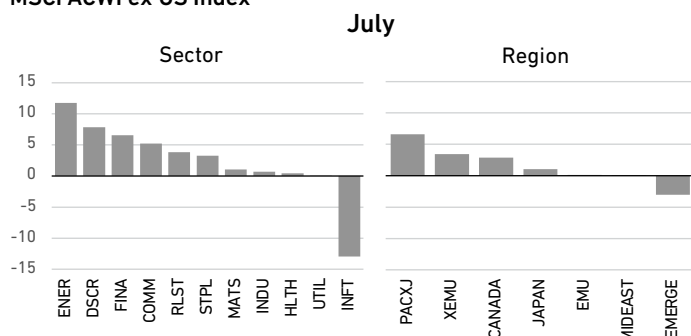

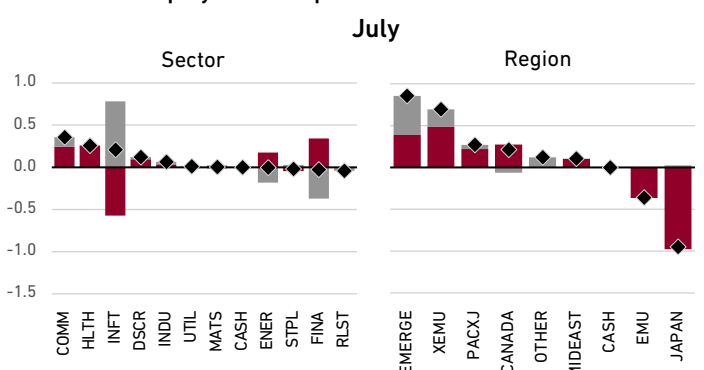
Index Performance (USD %)

MSCI ACWI ex US Index

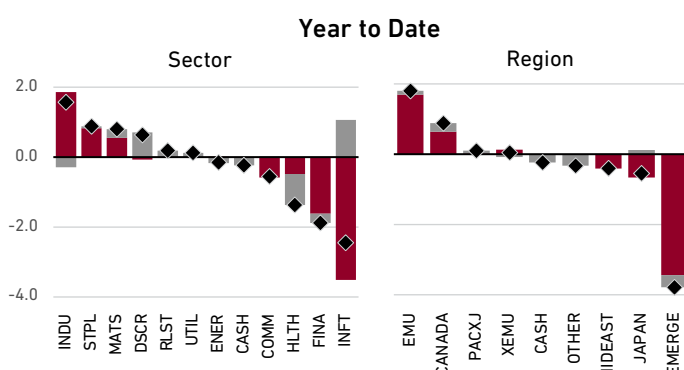


Performance Attribution Effect (%)

- In **Financials**, Spanish commercial bank BBVA raised its profitability guidance for 2026 and announced a 2 billion euro share buyback program.
- In **IT**, Disco Corp, ASML, Infineon Technologies, Lasertec, and TSMC all experienced sharp pullbacks as investors indiscriminately fled AI-related companies.
- In **Europe ex EMU**, shares of UK-based oil and gas producer Shell rose alongside oil prices as the US-Iran conflict reignited.

- In **Financials**, shares of India's HDFC Bank fell sharply due to concerns about the resignation of its chairman as well as its elevated loan-to-deposit ratio. Dutch payment processor Adyen detracted after narrowing its 2026 revenue growth outlook, citing macroeconomic uncertainty and planned incremental hiring.
- In **Industrials**, Japan-based human resources technology provider Recruit posted stronger-than-expected results and a favorable full-year outlook, supported by its success using AI tools to boost monetization.
- In **Emerging Markets**, shares of Chinese social media and gaming company Tencent declined as investors questioned its ability to profit from its aggressive investment in AI.
